We sat down with Marie Seenan, a retired teacher from East Kilbride, to understand why she dedicates so much time to the SCIAF family, both in our schools and her local parish...



When did you start volunteering with SCIAF and what does it involve?

I retired from primary teaching last year and started volunteering for SCIAF in October 2023. Throughout my time as a teacher in Catholic primaries, I was always very impressed with the work of SCIAF, so it was a natural 'fit' for me in my retirement. I've still got plenty left to offer!

What do you most enjoy about volunteering in schools?

The resources we are given by SCIAF's education team are great - there's something for every age. I enjoy using these resources to teach pupils about global justice, which is so important in the world we live.

I did my first school visit with the very experienced Mark Booker, from the Development Education team, which was great fun - and from there I was able to go it alone. It was lovely to see how the younger children engaged with the "This Is Our World" story, particularly the prop bag full of games!

What do the children get from **SCIAF's visits?**

I think it's important for pupils to be aware of how people live in other countries and to support them in developing a sense of global justice. It's important for our young people to think of others, particularly the poorest - and recognise how fortunate we are in Scotland.

With SCIAF's support, the children learn that those who are supported are encouraged to be self-sustaining, building their own businesses and shaping their own futures.

What's the highlight of your involvement with SCIAF at a Parish level?

I'm the named SCIAF contact for St Vincent de Paul's Parish in East Kilbride. and I very much enjoyed promoting the Lent appeal this year. In total, we raised £2,037 through coffee mornings and workshops - I was so pleased! SCIAF is the official aid agency of the Catholic Church in Scotland and is so deserving of all the support we can give.

Is there anything else you'd like to say?

I love volunteering with SCIAF and hope to continue working in schools and my Parish for as long as possible. I would encourage others to do so, if they have the time!

Claver and Odette, Rwanda In Rwanda, thanks to your donations, we have been supporting some of the country's poorest communities since the genocide in 1994. Claver, 64, and Odette, 61, are one such couple whose lives have changed for the better, thanks to your support of SCIAF.

"Our daughter died four years ago," explained Claver. "It was extremely hard. Life was very bad. We ate just once a day. Healthcare was a challenge. And the yield from our small plot was insufficient for our family's diet."

Thanks to SCIAF's partners in the Diocese of Kigali, however, the couple was enrolled in a livelihood project, receiving seeds and training to grow more food, a water tank for accessing clean water, and the gift of goats for their small plot.

Claver continued: "Before the project began, we owned just one goat – we now have 11! We sold some of the animals to earn money, allowing us to buy some land

"We then spent some more money from the goats on a new house. It has a roof made of corrugated sheets. Our old house was smaller and made of mud.

"Life in the new house is much better. We have electricity from solar panels. The water tank has made fetching water much easier. And we also sleep better as we have a mattress and mosquito net – it is much more comfortable."

Odette added: "There is hope now for the future. I can buy clothes for myself. I can buy my own shoes. I have a mattress and a bedsheet for night-time."


Claver and Odette practise their Muslim faith at the community mosque, where we chatted with the couple.

"Our Muslim faith has helped a lot. It teaches love, good manners. I've really appreciated that this project has helped everyone regardless of their religion. SCIAF is impartial. If you are vulnerable, they help.

"My message is to tell SCIAF 'thank you'. May God bless you all. Please be encouraged to give more. You've given us a hand up. We were vulnerable – we are no longer!"

Our mission is to work in the hardest places, to lift up the poorest people, and ensure everyone, everywhere can access the basics they need to survive and thrive.

Thanks to you, we can serve all our sisters and brothers regardless of their race, religion, background or beliefs. All are welcome at the table.

Made up of Bishops, priests and experts in their field, the Board guides decision making and ensures SCIAF's work meets the interests of all those we serve.



EORGAZA

The scenes of death, despair and devastation in Gaza have affected everyone across the SCIAF family over the past year. But while the scale of suffering has been hard to comprehend, your solidarity with those in need has been a constant source of hope.

Here we look at how you have helped SCIAF respond to the crisis in the Holy Land.



EMERGENCY RELIEF

After the terrible attacks in October. our Caritas partners were quick to respond to those most in need, providing essential medical aid, emergency food, psychosocial support and cash relief - and it is thanks to your long-term support of SCIAF, and donations to the Gaza emergency appeal, that this was one of the most effective humanitarian responses in the region.

When emergencies like this strike, SCIAF joins together with other Caritas agencies around the world, raising funds, pooling resources, and collaborating with local experts to get aid where it is needed most. It is an effective and fast-moving international model, which quickly gets cash to the real experts who live in the communities where emergencies strike.

UK ADVOCACY

Alongside our emergency work, we joined with UK charities to demand that the government de-escalate the conflict, including a campaign to ban the sale of arms to Israel. We asked you to campaign for peace in the Holy Land too by signing our petition.

Thousands of you signed our petition to the Prime Minister outlining our demands to bring about peace, release any hostages, and let aid flow into Gaza.

FR GABRIEL IN GLASGOW

In April, the SCIAF family came together in solidarity with Gaza, as we welcomed Fr Gabriel Romanelli, the Parish Priest of the only Catholic Church in the Gaza Strip, to Glasgow.

Together with the Archbishop of Glasgow, and our friends at Justice and Peace Scotland, we welcomed 330 guests to the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall, followed by a Mass at St Andrew's Cathedral on the banks of the Clyde.

It was a truly special day. Fr Gabriel lit up the room with his compassion for his parishioners and fellow Gazans, and his commitment to lasting peace in the Holy Land.



Action in Afghanistan

In October last year, devastating earthquakes struck western Afghanistan resulting in destruction in more than 300 villages. In addition to loss of life and injury, homes, health facilities, schools and water networks were destroyed. This large-scale disaster left thousands of already vulnerable families in urgent need of humanitarian assistance.

As temperatures plummeted through the Afghan winter, we responded quickly thanks to the Scottish Government's Humanitarian Emergency Fund, and our partners working in the country. For the coldest nights we supplied blankets and heaters, as well as small cash grants and sanitary items to the most affected communities.

In the following weeks, we began working with 22 families to 'build back better' from the damage caused. This included technical assistance to ensure homes and infrastructure were earthquakeproofed through stronger foundations, ring beams and corner bracing.



Scottish solidarity

African relief

Malawi food security

In response to the ongoing food crisis in Malawi, we supported our partner CADECOM to provide small cash grants to over 4,500 households. Most people used the money to purchase food, though the grants also supported other household needs including healthcare and fertiliser.

Loss and Damage in Zambia

Increased floods, droughts and storms are plaguing Zambia as a result of the climate crisis, hitting the poorest communities hardest. At the start of 2024, the heaviest rains for 20 years caused extensive floods in rural and urban areas. Through local Caritas agencies, we responded quickly to this dire situation with cash grants and food aid for local people, alongside the rebuilding of infrastructure.



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Tackling climate anxiety in the Catholic classroom

There's no doubt, the climate crisis is frightening.

Unless we make some big changes, the world is going to look like a very different place in the decades to come. There will be more extreme weather, more species going extinct, and many more people in the poorest parts of the world suffering dearly for a crisis they did not cause.



SCIAF's new resource

For young people in Scotland struggling to process what's happening, it's important to help redirect their anxiety from personal burden and fear towards actions that are just, caring, and seek the common good. With this in mind, SCIAF is supporting teachers with a new digital resource they've been asking for: 'Tackling climate anxiety in the Catholic classroom'.

The resource looks at the impact of the climate crisis on pupil wellbeing and helps teachers explore how Catholic Social Teaching, and particularly Laudato Si', can guide our response to climate anxiety.

Featuring a variety of video contributors, this resource includes hopeful stories from SCIAF's partners alongside opportunities to pray and reflect on the issues.

Strategies for tackling climate anxiety

The new resource focuses on the following three themes:

1 Building resilience

Pope Francis has said: "The most important thing in the life of every man and every woman is not that they should never fall along the way. The important thing is always to get back up." This resource helps teachers to engage young people in meaningful climate activities and discuss their feelings along the way. If things don't work out as expected, they are encouraged to reflect and continue to be hopeful for change.

2 Challenging hopeless narratives

Climate conversations are awash with misinformation, especially on social media. Sometimes climate change is labelled a hoax; sometimes the planet is doomed. This resource supports teachers to critically examine these controversial and hopeless narratives, discuss them in class, and build pupils' confidence in the science and solutions.

3 Sharing stories of positive change

The poorest people are suffering the impacts of the climate crisis first and worst. However, thanks to the generosity of the people of Scotland, SCIAF can provide support to those most affected by droughts, floods and storms, and put pressure on our leaders to do more to solve this crisis.

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From Benbecula to Bahia Solano

Fr Michael Hutson, Parish Priest at St Mary's in Benbecula, sits on SCIAF's Board. In June, he self-funded a trip to Colombia alongside **SCIAF** staff to help us prepare for next year's WEE BOX appeal. Here he reflects on his first-hand experience of SCIAF's transformational work...

'Impact' means to have 'a noticeable effect, an influential change'. It's a great title for this magazine because the support we give to SCIAF has a positive impact throughout the world.

I say this with confidence because I recently visited the poorest region of Colombia, Chocó, with its warm people, amazing jungles and dramatic beaches along the Pacific coast. Since the 1980s, Scottish Catholic generosity has been bringing about hope and change here in what is a very challenging place. In a number of creative projects, we help empower local people who 'hunger and thirst for what is right.'





We support families whose very existence on the rivers of Chocó are threatened by industrial levels of illegal gold mining



We support parents who worry about their sons and daughters being forced into one of several illegal armed groups that dominate the area



We support Afro-indigenous communities whose previous generations were enslaved people, and who still face extreme discrimination and racism today



We support women's groups with business opportunities



We support communities affected by the crime and violence caused by the ever-present cocaine industry, adding to endemic fear, disarray and exploitation



We support children, especially victims of trauma and violence. through youth clubs that use music or sport to help them experience and develop positive attitudes



And we support community leaders, especially from indigenous groups, striving for dignity, iustice and peace, and who are sometimes threatened, kicked out of their homes, killed or ominously 'disappeared'

I felt proud for Scotland when I experienced the impact that SCIAF is having in Colombia. Everyone kept thanking SCIAF, especially for simply 'being with them!'

We should approach SCIAF with a bit of GIVE and TAKE: GIVE generously and thoughtfully through this official agency of the Catholic Church; TAKE advantage of the informative and prayerful SCIAF materials we are sent or can access online. If we do this, SCIAF can have an impact on us too. Transformed, we can better conform to the will of the one who said: "Blessed are the peacemakers... Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for what is right."


