



CHILDREN'S LITURGY 4TH SUNDAY IN LENT, YEAR C

Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

The Parable of the Prodigal Son is one of the most famous stories in the Bible. Often, we focus only on the son who left, wasted his inheritance, came back and was welcomed by the father. He messed up, repented, then returned and was forgiven and accepted.

Let's not forget the lesson that comes from the attitude of the older brother. Although he stayed with his father, he was not a model example. Filled with bitterness, he could not accept his father's decision to welcome his brother back. The story is of God's grace rather than how good we are.

Be Dramatic!

Drama is very useful in remembering Scripture, so I suggest you read the parable and ask for volunteers to act out what you read. Nominate a younger brother, older brother and a father. Feed the actors the lines from Scripture and bring the story to life. No rehearsal is required, it is supposed to be spontaneous.

Discuss

Ask the children what they think of the story. Would they forgive the younger son if they were the dad? Do they think they might have reacted like the older brother? Who does the father represent in this story? Explain to the children that even though the older brother stayed with his father, he isn't a shining example to them. The older brother is judgemental, thinks that he is in the right, and cannot accept his father's decision. The two sons are loved and accepted based on their father's love for them, not because of their perfect behaviour.

Remind

Point out that God, our heavenly Father is like the father in the parable. He loves them, forgives them and calls them His children. No matter what they have done or said, God's grace is more than sufficient.

Connect with SCIAF


Read the following to the children:

In the parable, we see that the youngest son leaves home, and he is welcomed back by his father. Unfortunately, across the world we see lots of people leaving their homes because they are in danger – unlike in the parable.

Enrique's town was taken over by an illegal paramilitary group (you might want to say 'gang' or use language suitable to your age group). They wanted access to the community's land so they could use it to do bad things, like move drugs and illegally mine gold through the area.

Enrique and his family were forced to leave their home, with nowhere to go. Enrique said, "The Church was there when we were displaced, and when we returned to our homes too."

Thanks to your support, praying for the work of SCIAF, and for fundraising – alongside the dedication and bravery of our local partners – we've helped people like Enrique and his family return to their homes, keeping them safe during the process.

Enrique also said, "The Church has helped us return to our homes with all their might. Their presence has helped guard us from the armed groups that still operate here."
