Cancel debt, choose hope:

Action for global justice is powerful faith witness, living out the principles of Catholic Social Teaching.



In Colombia, despite the vibrant tapestry of natural beauty in its landscape, violence lurks around every corner, displacing families, forcing children into crime, and leaving communities dominated by armed gangs. In defiance of the peace agreement in 2016, violence and displacement remain, with 6.9 million people being forced to leave their homes due to conflict.

In Chocó, the poorest region, people face relentless conflict, poverty, and isolation, and feel forgotten by the world.

SCIAF stands with those in Chocó, advocating for justice and peace, providing shelter for those caught in the violence, and helping communities rebuild their lives long into the future.

COLOMBIA



MARGINALISED COMMUNITIES INCOLOMBIA

Perched between Colombia's Pacific Coast and the mountains of the Andes lies the vast region of Chocó. Rich in culture, biodiversity and landscape, it is an area of outstanding natural beauty and warmth of the people. However, Chocó is also the poorest region in Colombia.

SCIAF work with Indigenous and Afro-Colombian communities in and around Chocó.

EMBERÁ DOBIDÁ

Emberá communities are one of Colombia's largest indigenous populations, many of whom live in Chocó. With a rich cultural heritage deeply rooted in their ancestral lands, the Emberá people have a strong connection to the natural world.

Spanish and other colonists in the 16th century met fierce resistance from Emberá people defending their land and culture. Continued conflict, spanning centuries, caused the Emberá communities to move deeper into the mountains, and into territories inaccessible to outsiders.

The colonial presence in Chocó was motivated by access to natural resources such as gold and silver. Communities today are still under threat from illegal mining and exploitation of natural resources.

Despite the Constitution of 1991 (which outlined the legal duties to protect and uphold the human rights of Colombia's ethnic minorities and indigenous peoples) Emberá communities are still being forced

Rugby for Peace. Colòmbia from their ancestral lands, leading to mass displacement. In recent years, the UN has highlighted Emberá people as one of the most at-risk indigenous groups in the world due to the ongoing conflict.



AFRO-COLOMBIAN COMMUNITIES

Chocó is home to around 550,000 people, 90% of whom are Afro-Colombian. Spanish colonists forcibly brought enslaved people from Africa, beginning in the 16th Century. In the 1800s, following abolition, Afro-Colombians faced continued marginalisation and discrimination leading to socioeconomic disparities in the country.

In the early 1990's Afro-Colombian communities were granted territorial rights in Colombia, giving a similar status to indigenous people. However, political violence and conflict between paramilitary groups, drug traffickers, guerrilla groups and government forces has forced them from their territories and displaced millions of Afro-Colombians around Colombia. Today, Afro-Colombians are some of the most marginalised and disadvantaged people in Colombia.



ON THE FRONT LINE OF CONFLICT

SCIAF works with Church partners in the poorest part of Colombia to build peace in a forgotten conflict zone – one that never makes the headlines.



LUIS' STORY

Luis was sheltering in the church of San Pablo Apóstol in Colombia with his family and hundreds of local people when an armed group surrounded the building.



"When the bomb hit the room, everything went dark and smoky," Luis told SCIAF. "When the darkness lifted, a little two-year-old begged me not to leave him. I picked him up and took him out of the church. He died in my arms. When I got home, I just cried and cried."

Miraculously, Luis' whole family survived that terrible day. But 119 others were not so fortunate and perished in the explosion. The attack left the church in ruins. But despite the carnage, the 'mutilated Christ of Bojayá' – a crucifix of our Lord Jesus – survived, albeit with His arms and legs missing.

Today, the relic has been venerated by many, including Pope Francis during his visit to Colombia, as a reminder of the suffering endured by communities but also as a sign of hope for a better future.

ENRIQUE'S STORY

Enrique's town was taken over by an illegal paramilitary group. They wanted access to his community's land so they could traffic people and move illegal drugs and gold through the area.

Enrique and his family were forced from their home, with nowhere to go. Enrique told SCIAF, "But the Church was there when we were displaced, and when we returned to our homes too."

Thanks to your support, and the dedication and bravery of our local partners, we've helped displaced people like Enrique's family return to their homes, keeping them safe during the process.

"For those that finally returned to their homes, the state did not help - the Church,

however, has helped us return with all their might. Their presence has helped guard us from the armed groups that still operate here."



"With the help of Christ, Christ alive in the midst of the community, it is possible to usher in a new Colombia."

WEE BOX DAY OF PRAYER

Today, schools and parishes across Scotland dedicate time to pray for the people of Colombia and SCIAF's work around the world. Download the WEE **BOX** Day of Prayer resource to get involved.

In the book of Acts we can read the story of the early Church.

READ:



Acts 2:42-47

Ask pupils in groups to write down the similarities and differences between the early Church and their Church. Ask each group to share with the rest of the class.

The early Church were very close. The Bible tells us that they shared everything – money, food, possessions. They gave to those who were in need, they ate together, praised God together and learned together.

WATCH:



WEE BOX video - our work in Colombia

Ask your class to get into groups and list ways that the Church today, through SCIAF, is responding to those in need in Colombia. You could also research SCIAF's work on our website sciaf.org.uk Take some time to hear the pupil's findings.

Ask pupils to list activities that their parish is doing to serve others locally and globally.

REFLECT:



On our God given talents

Remind the pupils that they are part of the Church and encourage them to think about and write down their gifts and talents, and what they can give to the Church to meet the needs of others locally and globally.

OPTION FOR THE POOR ACTIVITY

WATCH:



CST in 3 mins video on SCIAF's YouTube channel



ACT:



Living out the preferential option for the poor

Allow pupils 10 mins to think of examples of how they can live out the principle of the preferential option for the poor in their lives.

Use the activity in the PowerPoint to critically examine actions using criteria like feasibility, appropriateness, effectiveness or cost. Ask for some feedback.

Explore the choices they have made and their reasons for them. Finally, discuss the criteria they used to make their ranking decisions.

READ:



CST PowerPoint 'Option for the poor'

Ask pupils to look at the quotes from Scripture in small groups or individually. Facilitate some of the discussion questions within the PowerPoint.



PRAY:



Advocates for the poor

Use the prayer within the PowerPoint with your class.

ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY:

Research a Catholic Saint or figure who exemplified the preferential option for the poor and oppressed. For example, St Martin de Porres, St Oscar Romero, St Vincent de Paul.



PEACE

Use the quotes on Peace Quotes pdf for this activity to create an agreement line.

Designate different parts of the room to 'agree', 'disagree' and 'not sure'.

Explain that you will read some quotes about peace, one by one, and the pupils should walk to the area of the room that represents how they feel about each quote.

After positions have been taken, ask:

- Why they have taken their positions, ask them to give reasons for their stance
- After they have heard each other's reasons, they are invited to change their stance if they wish
- · Repeat with the next quote

DEBRIEF

Here are some useful questions:

- · What did you think of these exercises?
- Was there anything surprising/shocking about the quotes/statements?
- Would any of these quotes/statements change your thinking about peace and or conflict?
- How did the quotes/statements feel relevant to this year's WEE BOX Appeal

CONFLICT

You could use Mentimeter to explore pupils understanding of conflict. The word cloud option lets participants make a visual representation of words that they can enter through their phones/devices.


For this activity use the question:

What is conflict?

Give pupils two minutes to think about this question, and then write their definitions. Once you can see their definitions, ask the following questions:

- How does the definition of conflict affect the way we think about conflict?
- What are some negative consequences of conflict?
- What are some positive outcomes of conflict?
 List two potential positive outcomes of conflict e.g. freedom from oppression
- What are some examples of conflict locally and globally?
- How does the media influence our awareness of national and global conflict issues?

Set up the agreement line again and read the statements from the Conflict pdf. Encourage discussion and debate between the pupils and allow them to change their position based on what they hear from others.






VIDEO REFLECTION

PRIMARY

Read: Luke 10:25-37 (The Good Samaritan) and Mark 1:40-45 (Jesus cures a man of leprosy). Then, discuss in groups how they might follow Jesus' example and use the discussion questions below.

SECONDARY

Read: Mark 1:21-45 (Jesus cures an unclean spirit) and John 13:1-15 (Jesus washes His disciples' feet). Use the discussion questions below and ask the pupils to make some notes from each question, ready to share with the rest of the class.

Leader: We gather today in recognition of our school joining The Big Lent Walk and supporting SCIAF to help our sisters and brothers living in some of the world's poorest places. We know that our physical journeys often mirror our spiritual journeys. May our time together today deepen our faith and strengthen our commitment to follow in Jesus' footsteps, bringing love to our neighbours.

Reflection

Leader: "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." Psalm 119:105. Imagine you're walking in a big, dark forest with no light at all. You might trip over or get lost. It would be really scary. But what if someone gave you a bright, shiny lamp? You could carry it with you, and suddenly, the path ahead would be clear, and you wouldn't be afraid anymore. That lamp would guide your way, just like the Psalm tells us.

God's Word is like that lamp for us. It shows us the way; how to be kind, how to love others. Just like a lamp lights up a dark forest, God's Word lights up our lives. It shows us the right path to follow.

Jesus gives us so many examples in the Bible. For example, He tells us to love one another, forgive those who hurt us, and be honest and kind. His words are like little lights that guide our way and help us make good choices.

This Lent we are showing love for our global neighbours by taking part in The Big Lent Walk. We are walking not only the path of solidarity but in the footsteps of Jesus, showing love to our less fortunate sisters and brothers.

Today, let us remember that we have this amazing gift from God, His Word, to be our light in all things that we do. When we follow His teachings and try to be like Jesus, we're guided on the right path. And just like a lamp in the dark, God's Word will always shine brightly in our hearts.

Closing Prayer

Leader: Let's say a prayer together to thank God for His Word and ask for His guidance.

Thank You for giving us Your Word as a lamp to our feet and a light to our path.

May Your grace give us the courage to face any challenges.
